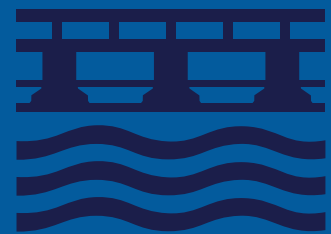

For 50 years we have provided young people with diverse experiences in a caring learning community. The passion of our staff in providing students with the opportunities to chase their dreams is what sets us apart. Set on beautiful large grounds, Patterson River is adjacent to the Kananook Creek and Seaford Wetlands and within walking distance to the beach along with a range of local sporting fields. 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Junior School (Years 7-9)

Our subject structure and student timetabling is centered on developing strong student-teacher relationships. Each student is provided with a mentor teacher who takes the class for up to 50% of the timetable, in some ways much like primary school. This allows us to get to know your child.

Transition Program

Patterson River prides itself on our partnership with local primary schools that enable us to provide students with a smooth transition into the secondary years. Transition activities include:

- **Transition Visits (Grade 5):** Students visit Patterson River to experience a day in the life of a secondary school student.
- **EXCEL Testing Days:** Testing for our EXCEL Academic & EXCEL Sport programs are designed to be an enjoyable day at Patterson River, completing a range of activities and meeting other primary school students.
- **Meet the Teachers:** Patterson River's transition team spend an afternoon sitting down with Grade 6 teachers to get background information on all students. This enables us to best cater for your child right from day one of Year 7.

- **Partnership Meetings:** Prior to Orientation Day, you will be invited to conduct a partnership meeting with your child's mentor teacher. This meeting will allow you and your child to find out important information about starting secondary school and ask lots of questions. It is also a great opportunity for the mentor teacher to get to know you and your child.
- **Extended Transition:** We provide some students who may be a little anxious about beginning secondary school with a number of sessions at Patterson River prior to Orientation Day. These small group sessions allow students to become familiar with the school.
- **Orientation Day:** In December, students spend the day at school. Students get to meet their new classmates and complete a number of sessions with their mentor teacher.



Year 7

Year 7 students are provided with their own dedicated classroom in our purpose built Year 7 Centre complete with co-ordinators' office, lockers and toilets. The Year 7 Centre is like having a primary school environment located within a secondary school setting.

Year 9

'Learning 4 Life'

Patterson River's multi award winning Year 9 Program engages students in a manner that few schools can match. With a focus on relationships and high expectations each student spends half of their timetable in the Year 9 Centre studying 'Learning 4 Life', a unique subject that combines four core subjects; English, Science, Humanities and Health. Each student is assigned a mentor teacher who steers them through a themed program:

Term 1: 'Our World' Sustainability, global citizenship, renewable energy

Term 2: 'Our Melbourne' Melbourne's history pre-Federation, weekly trips to CBD

Term 3: 'Our Future': Pathways, university visits, mortgages, careers expos

Term 4: 'Our Choices': Brain development, respectful relationships, safe partying.

Located at the rear of the school, the Year 9 Centre is equipped with:

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS	
<p>Entry into the EXCEL Sport program is based on a broad range of assessments, including physical ability, theoretical assessments and team based observations.</p> <p>Entry for Year 7 is determined through a testing day in May. Ongoing involvement in the program is reviewed on an annual basis, including reports, written application and interview. Students not involved in the program will have the opportunity to apply for a place when they become available.</p>	
YEAR 7 & 8	
<p>The focus at Year 7 & 8 is to expose participants to a range of team based sports in order to develop their technical and strategic ability along with working on an aerobic base. Students at this age are beginning to develop an understanding of individual strengths & weaknesses relating to a sport of choice.</p>	
YEAR 9	
<p>The focus at Year 9 is to develop an understanding of individual sporting predispositions and to work on developing these traits in relation to a particular sport. Students begin to develop an understanding of various physical attributes and specific training techniques. Students work on an individually tailored training program. At this level there is a large range of electives available for students to specialise in particular areas. A Sports Education in Physical Education Program (SEPEP) approach is used in order to expose students to a range of various roles within sport.</p>	
YEAR 10	
<p>The focus at Year 10 is for students to continue on their individual development whilst accelerating their academic knowledge and understanding to a VCE level. Students develop leadership skills and technical knowledge to assist them in their preparation for a pathway associated with potential involvement within the Sporting Industry. Classes at Year 10 continue with a SEPEP approach with a greater focus on coaching junior teams.</p>	
YEAR 11 & 12	
<p>The focus at Year 11 & 12 is on VCE and VET students in order to enhance opportunities for tertiary study and future employment. Students use their experience in the EXCEL Sport program to inform their future pathway, selecting course options that best suit their strengths. EXCEL Sport students are encouraged to take on College Leadership positions at this time.</p>

STEM Program

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) related programs are crucial for providing students with skills such as: problem solving, creativity, critical thinking, teamwork, independent thinking, initiative, communication and digital literacy. These skills are key for preparing students for future jobs. Our College has developed a program that allows our students the opportunity to access all branches of STEM in a range of different environments.

There are numerous electives at Years 8, 9 and 10 in the areas of Science, Design and Digital Technologies and Engineering, designed to engage students in figuring out their own individual passions and pathways in STEM. By the end of 2020, the College will also have started construction on our brand new STEM wing which will better cater for STEM learning in the senior years, but also support students to explore STEM in the junior years via specialised STEM challenge days to be offered across Years 7 and 8 from 2021 onwards.

Student Voice & Leadership Program

Many of the improvements that the College has embarked upon over the last 10 years have been generated through the ideas & insights of our student population. Both student voice and student leadership are an important element of our College programs.

Student Voice

Student Voice at Patterson River Secondary College enables students to provide valuable information on their learning experience, and also gives them the power to influence positive change. Students undertake surveys throughout the year to provide their teachers with feedback to further improve and develop their practice within the classroom. Student focus groups allow us to hear student opinions, ideas about initiatives and their areas of concern. Student voice is also shared through the Student Representative Council as each year level has appointed members who meet regularly.

At the College students have a range of formal leadership opportunities that they can apply for each year:

Student Leaders represent the College at a wide range of events and also work with different teachers to develop their leadership skills. They also work on student driven projects and initiatives to enhance the opportunities and experience of other students within the College.

Performing Arts Program

Our College has a proud history in providing students with diverse opportunities in the performing arts. Our recent construction of our \$1.5 million Performing Arts Centre provides students with a terrific facility to develop and demonstrate their artistic abilities.

Instrumental Music

In addition to compulsory classroom instrumental music in Year 7 & 8 (recorder and keyboard), students are provided with the opportunity to learn an additional instrument. The instrumental program provides weekly tuition via small group lessons. All of our music students find learning at the College an enjoyable experience, mostly due to the different activities that music students are involved in and the people they meet with similar interests. Together, students will form close bonds performing in one of our many bands and ensembles, including: Senior Concert Band, Junior Concert Band, String Orchestra, Senior and Junior Percussion Ensemble, Saxophone Ensemble, Clarinet Ensemble, Brass Ensemble, Stage Band, Flute Ensemble and our Bi-Annual Production Band.

Each student has one lesson per week with their instrumental teacher. Lessons are timetabled on Compass and are scheduled to take place on a rotating timetable so that they do not miss important educational opportunities. Instruments are available for hire from the College.

Laptop Program (BYOD)

Patterson River was one of the first schools in Australia to implement a Virtual Desktop Interface (VDI) Network. This innovative approach allows students to bring in their own laptop or iPad to use our software, file storage and network. In addition, students are able to log in from home to access software and their files. Our extensive network allows over 1500 devices to connect to our network everyday. This includes laptops, tablets, phones and iPads.

Benefits

- Families are not locked into the requirement of purchasing/leasing a new device upon starting secondary school
- No need to buy/update software for school
- Cloud based file storage for students (no lost work)
- No time wasted for teachers needing to help students with different software versions

Requirements

- OPTION 1
 - › Students bring an existing device from home that meets our specifications (as listed below).
- OPTION 2
 - › Parents buy computer through finance arrangements directly from a company.
- OPTION 3
 - › Parent purchases new device from one of the identified vendors outright.

Device Minimum Specifications

Device Specifications that must be met:

- Screen Size must be above 10 inches and no more than 17 inches
- Laptop must be able to hold charge for the entire day (we will not support charging during school)

- Must have Antivirus software installed and up to date. Software can be provided by the College

- Must have OSX version 10.13 or above installed
- Must have Antivirus software installed and up to date, software can be provided by the College

iPad*

- Must have iTunes account and ability to download required free App
- Must have a keyboard either attached or accessible via Bluetooth
- Software version must be IOS 12 or higher

Android Tablets*

- Must have Google/Playstore account and ability to download required free App
- Must be Wireless WPA2 Enterprise compliant
- Must have a keyboard either attached or accessible via Bluetooth

Chrome Books*

- Must have a Google Account
- Must be Wireless WPA2 Enterprise compliant

*Due to strict Microsoft licensing arrangements, students whose own device is an iPad, Chromebook or Android device, will need to pay an annual licensing fee of \$60 before their device is connected to the school's network. The price may vary based on the Microsoft pricing structure.

Senior School (Year 10-12)

The College offers senior students an individually tailored program designed to match their chosen pathway. The College offers students two main pathways: The Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) & The Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL).

In recent years, Patterson River has seen a significant improvement in student outcomes, including:

- 3 x 99+ ATARs
- Mean Study Score 30 English
- Mean Study Score 28 (all studies)
- 99% successful VCE completion rate
- Average DUX of 97.48 (5 year average)
- 84 individual 40+ study scores

Facilities

In 2017, Patterson River completed construction of our purpose built Senior School Centre incorporating:

- Senior classrooms
- Common room
- Presentation area
- Café style seating area
- Kitchen
- Dedicated Careers Office with full-time Careers Counsellor
- Coordinators' offices

Catering for over 500 students, our senior school programs are both rich and diverse. The College supports student growth and development through a range of addition support and extra curricula activities, including:

- **Students Access Monash (SAM) Program:** students have access to free tutoring and mentoring from Monash University students
- **English Extension Program:** weekly after school sessions assisting students with their study and revision for VCE English
- **Year 12 Study Skills:** Each VCE student completes 1hr per week of study skills, revision, health and exam preparation skills.

The College continues to maintain an excellent standard at VCE. Over 85% of our students go on to Tertiary education. The College offers over 35 VCE and VCAL subjects, as well as a wide variety of VET courses. Patterson River is the lead school for the \$20 Million Trade Training Centre located at Chisholm Frankston which enables our students easy access to a range of programs and vocational courses in a state of the art facility.

Our school zone

Students residing in this zone are guaranteed a place at our school, which is determined on the basis of your permanent residential address.

The Department provides guidance through the School Placement Policy to ensure that students have access to their designated neighbourhood school and the freedom to choose other schools, subject to facility limitations.

Application for Year 7

Procedure for students living in the College neighbourhood zone

- Each student will be provided with an application form for Year 7 student enrolment from their primary school. This form is general for all Year 6's and is known as the Southern Metropolitan Region – Application for Enrolment (Year 7) Form.
- Complete the form:
 - › The address shown must be the student's current residential address
 - › Identify Patterson River Secondary College as your first choice.
 - › Return the completed form to the primary school by the due date.

Note: This form must be returned to the primary school.

You will be contacted by your Primary School after Patterson River Secondary College has informed them that we have accepted the student placement.

Recent Changes to School Zones

The Department of Education & Training recently announced new school zones. This has resulted in a change of the zone for Patterson River Secondary. The new zone excludes some housing that was previously considered to be in zone. These areas include pockets of Seaford, Chelsea, Chelsea Heights, Edithvale and Carrum Downs.

Families who reside in areas no longer considered inside of zone will need to ensure that they complete an out of zone application to support a Year 7 enrolment application

Order for Priority Enrolments

1. Students for whom Patterson River Secondary College is the designated neighbourhood school.
2. Students who reside permanently at the same address as a brother or sister currently attending the Patterson River.
3. Students seeking enrolment on specific curriculum grounds*.
4. In a limited number of cases, a student may be enrolled on compassionate grounds, where there are significant family or individual circumstances. Wherever possible, the College will attempt to enrol students from main feeder primary schools who reside outside of zone provided that there are spaces available.
5. Any additional spaces available will be filled with students who are the next closest to our school zone.

*Specific Curriculum Grounds Claims

Parents/guardians who live outside the neighbourhood area may be considered for enrolment on the following curriculum grounds:

1. The student has been studying either German or Chinese at primary school, their child's neighbourhood school does not offer these languages as part of the curriculum and the child is interested in pursuing these studies to a senior level.
2. The student has a desire to participate in an EXCEL Program (Academic and/or Sport)
3. The student has a desire to participate in the Instrumental Music Program and has a proven interest in that area of the curriculum.
4. The student has a desire to participate in the STEM Program and has a proven interest in that area of the curriculum.
5. The parent/guardian is able to demonstrate clear curriculum continuity links between their child's primary school and the College.
6. The parent/guardian is able to demonstrate that the College provides a specific curriculum focus that is not available at other secondary Colleges.

Additional information may be sought to support an application for enrolment on curriculum grounds. It is essential that all communication between the College and parents is in writing and processed according to the above guidelines.

A guardian is defined as one who has been legally appointed to take responsibility for the person making the application for enrolment.

Process for completing an out of zone application

1. Ensure that Patterson River is indicated as the preferred school on the Application for Enrolment (Year 7) form provided by your child's primary school in April.
2. Provide any supporting evidence for an out of zone application according to the guidelines above and submitting in writing to the general office or electronically via our website.

Transport

Walking distance from Carrum Train Station, Patterson River is also serviced by a number of direct service bus routes.
