Principal's Message

For over 50 years we have provided young people with diverse experiences in a caring learning community. The passion of our staff in providing students with the opportunities to chase their dreams is what sets us apart. Set on beautiful large grounds, Patterson River is adjacent to the Kananook Creek and Seaford Wetlands and within walking distance to the beach along with a range of local sporting fields. The College has numerous partnerships with local community groups and sees itself as an important hub of the local community.

Patterson River prides itself on recruiting high performing staff who match the values of the school: Persistence, Excellence, Community & Respect; along with providing staff with excellent ongoing professional development and training. In recent times, the College has seen these efforts reap rewards through significant improvement in VCE results. The school consistently achieves strong NAPLAN 7-9 growth and in 2021 more than doubled similar schools for high growth in both Numeracy and Reading. Our latest Department of Education Parent Survey reported 90% parent positive endorsement for school satisfaction (similar schools = 76%).

We offer students a diverse range of co-curricular activities in modern facilities such as our new STEM centre, Performing Arts Centre, Senior School Centre and Stadium.

It is difficult to describe the full array of opportunities and brilliance of our College, therefore I encourage you to take the time to meet in person. Tours are held each Tuesday at 9.40am (bookings essential). Alternatively you can speak to the office to organise a personalised tour. I look forward to meeting you and your family.

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Junior School (Years 7-9)

Our subject structure and student timetabling is centered on developing strong student-teacher relationships. Each student is provided with a mentor teacher who takes the class for up to 50% of the timetable, in some ways much like primary school. This allows us to get to know your child.

Transition Program

Patterson River prides itself on our partnership with local primary schools that enable us to provide students with a smooth transition into the secondary years. Transition activities include:

- Transition Visits (Grade 5): Students visit
 Patterson River to experience a day in the life of
 a secondary school student.
- EXCEL Testing Days: Testing for our EXCEL Academic & EXCEL Sport programs are designed to be an enjoyable day at Patterson River, completing a range of activities and meeting other primary school students.
- Meet the Teachers: Patterson River's transition team spend an afternoon sitting down with Grade 6 teachers to get background information on all students. This enables us to best cater for your child right from day one of Year 7.

- Partnership Meetings: You will be invited to conduct a partnership meeting with your child's mentor teacher. This meeting will allow you and your child to find out important information about starting secondary school and ask lots of questions. It is also a great opportunity for the mentor teacher to get to know you and your child.
- Extended Transition: We provide some students who may be a little anxious about beginning secondary school with a number of sessions at Patterson River prior to Orientation Day. These small group sessions allow students to become familiar with the school.
- Orientation Day: In December, students spend the day at school. Students get to meet their new classmates and complete a number of sessions with their mentor teacher.



Year 7

Year 7 students are provided with their own dedicated classroom in our purpose built Year 7 Centre complete with co-ordinators' office, lockers and toilets. The Year 7 Centre is like having a primary school environment located within a secondary school setting.

Patterson River's multi award winning Year 9
Program engages students in a manner that few schools can match. With a focus on relationships and high expectations each student spends half of their timetable in the Year 9 Centre studying 'Learning 4 Life', a unique subject that combines four core subjects; English, Science, Humanities and Health. Each student is assigned a mentor teacher who steers them through a themed program:

EXCEL SPORT PROGRAM

VISION

To provide students with a developmental approach to a sporting pathway that focuses on both academic and practical outcomes.

VALUES

The EXCEL Sport program is closely aligned to the College's Values: Persistence, Community, Excellence & Respect. The values of the program go beyond just sporting achievements, focusing on team work, participation and personal best.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Entry into the EXCEL Sport program is based on a broad range of assessments, including physical ability, theoretical assessments and team based observations.

Entry for Year 7 is determined through a testing day in August. Ongoing involvement in the program is reviewed on an annual basis, including reports, written application and interview.

Students not involved in the program will have the opportunity to apply for a place when they become available.

YEAR 7 & 8

The focus at Year 7 & 8 is to expose participants to a range of team based sports in order to develop their technical and strategic ability along with working on an aerobic base. Students at this age are beginning to develop an understanding of individual strengths & weaknesses relating to a sport of choice.

YEAR 9

The focus at Year 9 is to develop an understanding of individual sporting predispositions and to work on developing these traits in relation to a particular sport. Students begin to develop an understanding of various physical attributes and specific training techniques. Students work on an individually tailored training program. At this level there is a large range of electives available for students to specialise in particular areas. A Sports Education in Physical Education Program (SEPEP) approach is used in order to expose students to a range of various roles within sport.

YEAR 10

The focus at Year 10 is for students to continue on their individual development whilst accelerating their academic knowledge and understanding to a VCE level. Students develop leadership skills and technical knowledge to assist them in their preparation for a pathway associated with potential involvement within the Sporting Industry. Classes at Year 10 continue with a SEPEP approach with a greater focus on coaching junior teams.

YEAR 11 & 12

The focus at Year 11 & 12 is on VCE and VET students in order to enhance opportunities for tertiary study and future employment. Students use their experience in the EXCEL Sport program to inform their future pathway, selecting course options that best suit their strengths.

EXCEL Sport students are encouraged to take on College Leadership positions at this time.


STEM Program

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) related programs are crucial for providing students with skills such as: problem solving, creativity, critical thinking, teamwork, independent thinking, initiative, communication and digital literacy. These skills are key for preparing students for future jobs.

Our College has just opened a multi-million STEM centre that includes a range of advanced technology utilised by students across all year levels. In addition to the core Design & Technology curriculum, there are numerous electives across all year levels designed to engage students in figuring out their own individual passions and pathways in STEM. Our subjects are designed to assist students with building the skills for the jobs of the future in engineering, design and advanced manufacturing. Equipment includes:

Student Voice, Goal Setting & Leadership Programs

Many of the improvements that the College has embarked upon in recent years have been generated through the ideas and insights of our student population. The school has a number of leadership roles with student leadership development supported as part of the roles.

Student Voice

Student Voice at Patterson River Secondary College enables students to provide valuable information on their learning experience, and also gives them the power to influence positive change. Students undertake surveys throughout the year to provide their teachers with feedback to further improve and develop their practice within the classroom. Student focus groups allow us to hear student opinions, ideas about initiatives and their areas of concern. Student voice is also shared through the Student Representative Council as each year level has appointed members who meet regularly.

Student Goal Setting

In 2024, Patterson River is supporting students to take ownership of their learning through a structured approach to goal setting across Years 7-12. Students use a template to track a range of personal goals, targets, strategies and outcomes across a range of areas such as future pathways, SPWBS, wellbeing, reading and numeracy.

These goals and celebration of achievements will be incorporated into established College processes such as parent teacher interviews, parent partnership meetings and reports.


Instrumental Music

In addition to compulsory classroom instrumental music in Year 7 & 8 (recorder and keyboard), students are provided with the opportunity to learn an additional instrument. The instrumental program provides weekly tuition via small group lessons. All of our music students find learning at the College an enjoyable experience, mostly due to the different activities that music students are involved in and the people they meet with similar interests. Together, students will form close bonds performing in one of our many bands and ensembles, including: Senior Concert Band, Junior Concert Band, String Orchestra, Senior and Junior Percussion Ensemble, Saxophone Ensemble, Clarinet Ensemble, Brass Ensemble, Stage Band, Flute Ensemble and our Bi-Annual Production Band.

Each student has one lesson per week with their instrumental teacher. Lessons are timetabled on Compass and are scheduled to take place on a rotating timetable so that they do not miss important educational opportunities. Instruments are available for hire from the College.

Laptop Program (BYOD)

Patterson River was one of the first schools in Australia to implement a Virtual Desktop Interface (VDI) Network. This innovative approach allows students to bring in their own laptop to use our software, file storage and network. In addition, students are able to log in from home to access software and their files. Our extensive network allows over 1500 devices to connect to our network everyday.

Benefits

- Families are not locked into the requirement of purchasing/leasing a new device upon starting secondary school
- No need to buy/update software for school
- Cloud based file storage for students (no lost work) via Office 365
- No time wasted for teachers needing to help students with different software versions

Purchasing Options

 - > Parents buy a computer through finance arrangements directly from a company.
- OPTION 3
 - Parents purchase new device from one of the identified vendors outright.

Senior School (Year 10-12)

The College offers senior students an individually tailored program designed to match their chosen pathway. The College offers students two main pathways: The Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) & VCE Vocational Major (formerly The Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCE VM).

In recent years, Patterson River has seen a significant improvement in student outcomes, including:

- 3 x 99+ ATARs
- Mean Study Score 30 English
- Mean Study Score 28 (all studies)
- 99% successful VCE completion rate
- Average DUX of 97.48 (5 year average)
- 84 individual 40+ study scores

Mentor and Careers Program

Our school has developed a custom subject in senior school called 'T@SK'. Starting in Year 10, students undertake a subject that includes goal setting, life skills, financial literacy and careers counselling. In most secondary schools, these important topics are often covered by one off sessions or assemblies, however by including in our unique subject across senior school, students are supported by their mentor teacher leading to high levels of support and sound decision-making for students.

Catering for over 500 students, our senior school programs are both rich and diverse. The College supports student growth and development through a range of addition support and extra curricula activities, including:

- Students Access Monash (SAM) Program: students have access to free tutoring and mentoring from Monash University students
- English Extension Program: weekly after school sessions assisting students with their study and revision for VCE English
- Year 12 Study Skills: Each VCE student completes one hour per week of study skills, revision, health and exam preparation skills.
- Three Year VCE Program: Year 10 students are provided with the opportunity to pick a VCE subject in Year 10.
- High Flyers English Extension Program
- World Challenge Trip: Year 10 & 11 students only
- Year 10 Work Experience
- Careers Excursions
- Homework Club (Wednesday afternoons)
- Holiday Revision Program
- Study tour to Germany
- · Senior School Formal
- Peer Support Program

The College continues to maintain an excellent standard at VCE. Over 85% of our students go on to Tertiary education. The College offers over 35 VCE and VCE VM subjects, as well as a wide variety of VET courses. Patterson River is the lead school for the \$20 Million Trade Training Centre located at Chisholm Frankston which enables our students easy access to a range of programs and vocational courses in a state of the art facility.

Enrolment Guidelines & Out of Zone Application Process

Enrolments for Year 7 Students

Priority Order of Placement

Eligible children and young persons have the right to be admitted to their designated neighbourhood government school, regardless of capacity.

In circumstances where schools do not have sufficient accommodation to accept all students who apply from outside their school zone, schools must manage enrolment applications in accordance with the following priority order of placement:

- Students with a sibling at the same permanent address who are attending the school at the same time
- 2. All other students in order of closeness of their home to the school.

In circumstances where schools do not have sufficient accommodation to accept all students who apply from outside their school zone, schools must manage enrolment applications in accordance with the following priority order of placement:

Priority 1. Siblings

The sibling priority applies to placement decisions at all year levels, from Year 7 to Year 12. There is an expectation that schools will enrol all older and younger siblings, unless otherwise approved by the regional director.

A sibling is defined broadly and can include stepsiblings and students residing together as part of a multiple family cohabitation or out-of-homecare arrangements, including foster care, kinship care and permanent care. Students seeking enrolment on sibling grounds should be residing together at the same permanent address and must be attending the school at the same time. Where siblings do not reside together on a full-time basis, families may still seek enrolment on sibling grounds. These applications will be considered on a case-by-case basis. If there are complex sibling arrangements such as this, schools should contact their regional office to seek advice. Regional office contact details and locations are on the department's website.

Priority 2. Order of closeness of their home to the school

In metropolitan areas, and in Ballarat, Bendigo and Geelong, closeness to school is the distance measured in a straight line from the child's permanent residential address to the school. In any other area of Victoria, closeness to school is the distance measured by the shortest practical route by road.

Distances from an address to the 5 nearest schools (as measured in a straight line) are available on the Find my School website. This website can be used when considering order of closeness to school, particularly for metropolitan areas, and in Ballarat, Bendigo and Geelong. In other areas, schools should consider travel distance between the applicants address and the school when considering order of closeness.

Closeness to school is either assessed upon receipt of an enrolment application or as part of the annual Year 7 placement processes for government schools.

Timelines will be strictly observed for Year 7 placement applications. If an application for Year 7 placement misses the deadline, it should be considered after applications received on time (if the student does not live in the school zone or does not have a sibling attending the school at the same time).

Exceptional circumstances - compassionate grounds

In exceptional circumstances, a student may be enrolled at a school on compassionate grounds. This is an overarching consideration and does not form part of the priority order of placement.

Families must be able to clearly demonstrate the exceptional circumstances which they believe make an enrolment at their designated neighbourhood school unsuitable for their child or children.

Exceptional circumstances may include family violence, wellbeing and safety concerns, physical and/or mental health concerns. Importantly, this is not a comprehensive list of exceptional circumstances whereby a family may seek an enrolment on compassionate grounds – each application will be dealt with on a case-by-case basis."

Our school zone

Our school zone is available on the back cover of this booklet. The website, **findmyschool.vic.gov.au**, hosts the most up-to-date information about Victorian school zones.

Students residing in this zone are guaranteed a place at our school, which is determined on the basis of your permanent residential address.

The Department provides guidance through the School Placement Policy to ensure that students have access to their designated neighbourhood school and the freedom to choose other schools, subject to facility limitations.

Application for Year 7

Procedure for students living in the College neighbourhood zone

- Each student will be provided with an application form for Year 7 student enrolment from their primary school. This form is general for all Year 6's and is known as the Southern Metropolitan Region - Application for Enrolment (Year 7) Form.
- Complete the form:
 - The address shown must be the student's current residential address
 - Identify Patterson River Secondary College as your first choice.
 - Return the completed form to the primary school by the due date.

Note: This form must be returned to the primary school.

You will be contacted by your Primary School after Patterson River Secondary College has informed them that we have accepted the student placement.

Process for completing an out of zone application

- Ensure that Patterson River is indicated as the preferred school on the Application for Enrolment (Year 7) form provided by your child's primary school in April.
- Provide any supporting evidence for an out of zone application according to the guidelines above and submitting in writing to the general office or electronically via our website.

Transport




